
Tea & Coffee after Mass

O that you would tear the heavens open and come down

Reflections on the Readings

1st Sunday of Advent

3rd December

In the Catholic tradition, a Homily, interprets the readings, shining a light on the present and asking each one of us what we must change in our lives, from today. The challenge is not so much about recounting the history or retelling the story, but living the gospel.

Stay Awake, Be Prepared and Get Ready...

This Sunday we begin a new season in the liturgical calendar of the Church. Today, we begin the great Season of Advent. There are two messages that we will hear over the next four weeks. One message and set of values will come to us from the media and the shops. We will be told that we will have to move faster, stay busy, queue longer in the shops and spend more money on those 'must have' presents so that we will have the 'perfect' Christmas, as if such a thing exists. We will be told and sold the idea that unless we buy more and more and surround ourselves with all the trappings of Christmas, we won't be happy. This most definitely is 'fake news.' However there is a very different message and set of values that will be offered to us through the gospels, the prayers and the liturgy of Advent. We are being asked to prepare a way for the Lord, to stay awake, to make a straight a path for the Lord and to get ourselves ready to celebrate the birth of Jesus. This is most definitely is 'Good News!

The message of Advent is an invitation and it also a challenge to us. We are called to be looking forward, to be ready, to be prepared and we are asked to wait in joyful hope.

Waiting is not something that we are usually good at these days. Our modern world tells us to move faster in so many ways. We have smart phones, emails and microwave ovens that all 'help' us to get through our busy days. However Advent asks each of us to do very opposite. During these sacred days of preparation, we are being asked to take some time to be still and silent as we prepare ourselves deeply for the Christmas. While we can't simply ignore the shops, the media and the advertisements over the next few weeks, neither can we ignore the words and message of Jesus in today's gospel; 'Be on your guard, stay awake, because you never know when the time will come... what I say to you I say to all: Stay awake!"

If we get too caught up in the shopping and spending, there is the danger that we will miss what Advent is really about. This is what the call to 'stay awake' means. We are asked not to miss the next four weeks of Advent. We are asked to prepare and get ready as best we can as followers of Jesus. It would be so sad, that if after the shopping and all the other preparations we missed Advent and its joyful and hopeful message.

In what ways can I prepare a way for the Lord this Advent as I get ready to celebrate the birth of Jesus at Christmas?

34th Sunday of Ordinary **1st Sunday of Advent** 3rd December 2023

The term 'advent' means 'coming', but behind this seemingly simple word is a deep and multi-layered season of the Church's year – one which we should really seek to enter into as fully as possible, rather than simply allow our preparations for Christmas be limited to buying presents and food.

The 'coming' which advent refers to is, of course, Christ's – but in reality this means that there are three different comings to which we can turn our minds and our hearts. The first is his coming as an infant all of those years ago; this is why we speak of the Church's year beginning with Advent, we start by journeying towards Christ's coming at Christmas...that moment which was the beginning of the Church, the beginning of our new relationship with God. There is a strong and deep tradition of reading the prophets during this season, so many of God's people were looking forward to the coming of the Messiah, and while they waited he gave them messengers like Isaiah to speak of the new world which the Messiah would bring about. Those prophets made God's people ready, and by reading them, by pondering them we too can make ourselves ready to recall Christ's birth at Christmas.

That new world which the prophets spoke of has been brought about; we are all living in the middle of it. But we cannot fail to notice that the lion is not yet lying down with the lamb (as Isaiah famously almost says). There is another coming towards which we should also look. The final coming of Christ. There is a moment, and we do not know either the day or the hour, when Christ will return; and then his work of redemption will be completed. The final judgment will separate us into the sheep and the goats (as we heard in the Gospel last week).

We are called to look forward to this coming during Advent as well. It will be soon, but soon in God's terms is often different to in our terms – it has been coming soon for the past two thousand years. We are called to be alert and ready, as we are told the in Gospel today. But this shouldn't mean worrying about it – one of my favourite stories from the Saints refers to S. Philip Neri, he was playing bowls with some friends and was asked what he would do if he knew the second coming would happen in an hour's time...he replied quite simply 'finish the game of bowls'. He was ready to meet with Christ at any moment, and therefore had no worry or fear. For the rest of us, perhaps a little more preparation would be sensible; Advent is well established as a time for confession, a help to prepare us spiritually for Christ's coming both at Christmas and his second coming.

As well as looking back to Christ's first coming, as a baby, and looking forward to his second coming as judge of the world, we can also look to his coming in the present. While there is a gap between his return to heaven and his return, he hasn't abandoned his people. He is always with us, above all in the Blessed Sacrament. Every time we come to Mass there is an 'advent'. Just as he came as an infant in order to be close to his people, and to draw us close to God; so too when he comes to us at Mass, it is to be close to his people and to draw us close to God.

Similarly, when we come to Mass, we come close to Christ, we respond to his invitation. We look back to that moment when he first became one of us and was born in Bethlehem, we also look forward to that moment when he will return in glory for judgment.

Memorial Acclamation

We have got used to singing the memorial acclamation using the first option. So that there is some variety today we will sing the second text ('When we eat this Bread and drink this Cup, we proclaim your Death, O Lord, until you come again'), the tune is very similar and I'm sure that we will get used to this over the next few weeks.
